
The Golden Compass Book Review



Maya Angelou

Maya Angelou was an american poet, memoirist, and civil rights activist who was born on April 4, 1928 and passed away on May 28, 2014. She is best known for her series of seven autobiographies which focus on her childhood, adolescence, and adult experiences.

Rosa Parks

Rosa Parks was an African American civil rights activist who is known for her important role in the Montgomery Bus Boycott. On December 1, 1955 parks refused to give up her seat on a Montgomery, Alabama bus to a white man which led to her getting arrested and sparked a year long boycott of the city's buses by African Americans.

Jackie Robinson

Jackie Robinson was an American professional baseball player and the first African American to play in Major League Baseball during the modern era. He was born on January 31, 1919 in Cairo Georgia and passed away on October 24, 1972 in Stamford, Connecticut. Robinson played for the Brooklyn Dodgers from 1947 to 1956 and was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1962.

King Sr. and Alberta Williams King. King's father was the pastor at their church. When King was a kid he had become friends with a caucasian boy from across the street when they were both six years old. But after a while of them being friends the boy's parents stopped them from meeting by stating "We are white, you are colored." This was one of Martin's early introductions to segregation as a child. Also in King's childhood, he had witnessed his father stand up to segregation on many occasions, particularly when his father had led a march to city hall with hundreds of people, protesting for their rights.


Moving forward, when Martin Luther King Jr. was older he had married Correta Scott when he was a preacher studying at Boston University. They had four children, Yolanda King, Martin Luther King III, Dexter Scott King, and Bernice King. Martin's first boycott was the Montgomery Bus Boycott. When he was asked to be the leader of it, he was hesitant but took the offer. The boycott lasted 385 days. This led to Martin's house being bombed and him later being arrested for going 30mph in a 25mph zone. However, the boycott wasn't in vain because the US District Court prohibited racial segregation on Montgomery public buses after that. In 1957, King and other civil rights activists founded the Southern Christian Leadership Conference to organize other black churches for non-violent protests.

In 1963 King was a representative for the SCLC in the "March on Washington Jobs and Freedom". This march demanded that there will be no more racial segregation in schools, law, employment, protection from police brutality, and a \$2 minimum wage. In this march, King delivered his famous "I have a dream" speech. It was considered a success because all of the rights were put at the top of the Civil Rights Act in 1964. After King had given his "I've been to the mountaintop" speech, he went back to the Lorraine Motel, Room 306. His last words being said to a musician, Ben Branch, were "Ben, make sure you play 'Take my hand, Precious Lord' ". Then at 6:01pm on April 4th 1968, Martin was shot on the second floor balcony by James Earl Ray. The bullet entered his cheek then traveled down his spinal cord before lodging into his shoulder, He was only 39 years old at the time. Martin Luther King, Jr. was a great leader who no doubt would have so much more had his life not been cut so short.

Now today we all know his legacy, as he is one of the cornerstones for civil rights. We as a



society wouldn't have evolved for the better without him. The same year that King had died, his wife established the "King Center" in Atlanta Georgia, and had kept up as a civil rights activist until her death in 2006. Beginning in 1971, cities and states recognized Martin Luther King Jr. and his actions and made the annual holiday "Martin Luther King Day". Later the same day in 1983 was established a federal holiday by Ronald Reagan. Martin Luther King had not only helped black civil rights but many of his movements had helped civil rights for women too. We are to thank not only Dr. King, but the many that had helped him and those who fought for their rights and those who still do today.



Series Review: Percy Jackson and the Olympians


